



## **I am Harriet Tubman Vocabulary Expansion Activity**

### **Tips for Reading Aloud:**

- 1. As you are reading, define the key words in this activity. For example, define the word “enslave” as you are reading since this is an important key word to understanding the story.**
- 2. Discuss what a synonym is. If your child has trouble finding a word that is a synonym to the key vocabulary word, give hints and examples.**
- 3. Discuss what an antonym is. If your child has difficulty with this, give examples!**
- 4. In order to carry over these vocabulary words to long term memory, use these words in conversation. For example, talk about what the word “freedom” means to you. This in itself can begin a wonderful conversation about a complex topic.**
- 5. Don’t forget to have fun! You don’t need to target all of the words at once. This is a book that can read over and over so target different key words each time you read it to your child.**
- 6. Draw a picture! One of the best ways to express an idea is through drawing!**
